"Delivering better cancer care" booklet

"Delivering better cancer care" is an information booklet about cancer in Australia and what the government is doing about it, particularly in rural, regional and remote areas of Australia. Published in April 2010, the booklet demonstrates the Government plans to prevent cancer, improve access to cancer care services in regional areas of Australia, to strengthen care for cancer patients and to build a world class cancer care system in Australia.

Core capabilities in genetics for medical graduates

Every physician, particularly those working in cancer care, in the 21st century will need to have a practising knowledge of the principles of human genetics and their application to a wide variety of clinical settings. The Human Genetics Society of Australasia established a working group of genetics experts to establish guidelines about the extent and level of genetic knowledge, skills, and behaviours that all doctors need at the start of their careers.

Pathways for Patient Safety

Pathways for Patient Safety are a series of Web tools you can use to increase awareness, knowledge and implementation of best practices for reducing the risk of patient harm in physician practices. The modules are:

- Working as a Team - outlines actions required for building high-performing patient safety teams and techniques for effective communications among care givers to reduce patient harm;
- Assessing Where You Stand - provides practical steps toward minimizing medical errors by assessing current patient-safety procedures, addressing practice culture and setting goals;
- Creating Medication Safety - describes factors practices should consider when implementing or augmenting a medical reconciliation process, and when prescribing or administering medications that may be harmful to patients.

Physician Practice Patient Safety Assessment® (PPPSA)

The Physician Practice Patient Safety Assessment® (PPPSA) is a self-assessment tool that helps physician practices evaluate their patient-safety processes and detect areas for improvement. PPPSA is designed to enhance physician awareness of patient safety; heighten provider knowledge of characteristics that make a practice safer; and create baseline comparisons for practices to use to enhance and support patient safety. The tool can be used by physicians to provide safer and better care, reduce liability and facilitate conversation among staff to identify opportunities for increasing patient safety in areas regarding medication safety; patient handoffs and transitions; surgery and invasive procedures; personnel qualifications and competency; practice management and culture; and patient education and communication.

National Centre for Asbestos Related Diseases (NCARD) is a research centre funded by the federal government as part of the Government's Strengthening Cancer Care package with measures aimed at prevention, treatment and support for cancer patients and their families. NCARD is a collaboration of researchers who have a national and strategic focus for research into asbestos related diseases and cancers and provides a platform to build on Australia's existing research expertise and encourages strong organisational and linkages to ensure our research is systematic and complementary to existing research efforts in the area of asbestos related diseases. International Society of Nurses in Cancer Care (ISNCC) Webinars

The major objective of the new ISNCC webinar program is to offer ISNCC members and non-members the opportunity to engage in nursing educational opportunities on a range of cancer and cancer nursing topics at a reasonable cost and in the convenience of their own office or home. Participants and speakers only require internet and phone access; therefore, webinars provide informative, timely and cost-effective international education. Multiple participants at one institution can benefit from the same webinar by using a speakerphone and communal monitor/projector. The application typically lasts 1 hour and can consist of more than one speaker. Questions from the audience are usually addressed at the end of the presentations thus providing a fully interactive learning medium.

Advance Care Planning e-learning course

The Advance Care Planning (ACP) course is Part 1 of the Respecting Patient Choices (RPC) education course geared to provide a broad introduction to ACP. The course consists of six modules that take approximately one hour to complete and cover basic definitions, legal aspects,

considerations regarding end of life decision-making and communication, the actual process of holding advance care planning conversations, as well as systemic matters that underpin ACP. Part 2 is a full day workshop that focuses on communication skills giving you the opportunity to train and build your advance care planning skills in an applied setting to assist you in leading end of life decision-making discussions.

Gynaecological cancer elearning modules for health professionals

Information presented as elearning modules (generally Powerpoint/voice over format) that support health professionals to increase their knowledge and understanding about the various issues of patients diagnosed with gynaecological cancer. The modules include: Gynaecological cancer patient management, psychosocial distress, sexuality, complementary therapies, pain management, end of life and survivorship.
